Manalansan Resigns as FASAE SoCal President

On April 27, 2010, an email went out from then President of FASAE SoCal, Dan Manalansan addressed to Officers, Directors and Board of Advisers with the Subject "Resignation Letter". Undoubtedly, the announcement came as a stunner; it was unexpected as it was unprecedented, a first. At the time of his resignation, Manalansan had served a third of his two-year tenure in office, having been elected earlier and sworn in as president of FASAE SoCal, in September 2009. That same year in June, he was also elected to the National Board of Directors for a one-year term in an effort to re-establish a collaborative effort with FASAE National. In the short three-sentence paragraph of his e-letter rest these three keywords why he resigned, and that was "...family comes first..."

Manalansan unmistakable resolution has always been that his moral obligation was to his family and that responsibility comes second to none. That above all else, his life's circumstance and priorities at the time that prompted his resignation was to be with his 13-year old daughter Crystal, in Houston, TX while his ex-spouse left for a serious and debilitating medical treatment in the Philippines. His life changing decision was no small sacrifice, moving to another State meant uprooting his settled life in California for the past 29 years.

It also meant leaving an established network of friends, colleagues, professional affiliates, and a stable and secure job with Monogram Systems. A company he dedicated 23 years of his existence and rose in the ranks from draftsperson, to professional design engineer and for the last five years, as quality manager responsible for the Monogram's Boeing 787 program.

There were no shades of doubt that the entire FASAE SoCal organization understood, approved his decision of leaving, and appreciated his faithful services since 2003 when he first joined SoCal Chapter seven years ago.

According to the presentation, the Filipinos, second only to Chinese with their number in the 2.8 million range, are about 2.2 million in number here in the United States. The biggest concentration of Filipinos in the U.S. is in the State of California (a little over a million), in the city of Los Angeles (350,000) followed by San Diego (130,000).
